Message from the YIS Principal.

In the Second Term of this Academic Year 2021-2022, the Government has given the green light to the YIS to offer education based on a hybrid education program, which combines online learning from home, with face-to-face learning in the classroom at school. In cooperation with the health authorities, we maintain strict health protocols to secure a safe environment at the YIS campus for our students, their teachers, and their parents. Our students who are enrolled in the Early Years (EY) and Primary Years Program (PYP) enthusiastically reunited with their classmates and teachers and resumed their lessons in the spacious classrooms and the outdoor gardens, playing and sports facilities. Also, our secondary school students enrolled in the Middle Years Program (MYP) and the Diploma Program (IBDP) welcomed the opportunity to meet again with their friends and teachers, and to prepare themselves for the assessment tests and exams of the International Baccalaureate program.

The traditional YIS End-of-the-Year event will be marked by a musical drama titled 'High Five' with our YIS students as the singers, actors, and musicians, and orchestrated and directed by our YIS teachers. The event will take place on 17 December 2021 during the daytime in the basketball court of the school in accordance with the Covid-19 protocols, only students and teachers will attend. Parents and guardians will be able to watch the performance of their children online. We expect that the sparkling performance will inspire all of us to close the year 2021 together in a festive holiday mood and to welcome the new year 2022 with a smile.

The Early Years Programme

In Term 2, the activities of the Early Years students were based on the theme 'How We Express Ourselves'. Early Years students explored the importance of celebrations and traditions in different cultures and traditions from all over the world. The students learned how people celebrate different special occasions dependent on the culture and traditions of their home country and learned the reasons why they celebrate. Parents from different countries enthusiastically participated in the learning process by sharing their

knowledge and experience of their own culture and traditions. The students especially enjoyed the presentations by the guest speakers. Play-based learning is an essential part of the learning process, and for this purpose, students can choose their playing tools, playing time, and playing area according to their interests.









Preschool

Preschool students have started to learn the alphabet, starting from the first 3 letters a, b, c. They were asked to make crafts that relate to these letters, for example: "A stands for an alligator", "B stands for a bus" and "C stands for a caterpillar". Through hands-on activities, students practiced their motor skills, and at the same time improved their literacy. They also enjoyed making their own playdough by mixing flour, salt, oil, and food

coloring. The students then used this playdough to make the shapes of letters. Besides, they have been cutting, coloring, and pasting pictures.



Kindergarten A dan B _____

The students of Kindergarten A and B focused in Term 2 on the theme 'Celebrations and Traditions' of different countries. Celebrations are an integral part of each child's cultural identity. The students learned new traditions and celebrations from their friends in their class. Each experience is a learning opportunity. The kids enjoyed the Halloween celebration with their teachers and classmates, dressed as characters from different countries. The students also explored written words as a first step towards reading.











Primary Years Programme

During Term 2, the PYP focused on the theme 'How We Express Ourselves'. Students learned how we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs, and values. Self-expression is essential for the development of a child's identity, self-confidence, and sense of belonging in this world. It opens the hearts and minds of young students and allows them to form thoughts and ideas that often surprise us. Self-expression also helps children to communicate their feelings and emotions. Grade 1-2 students focused on how 'How cultures are expressed through traditional arts', Grade 3-4 students explored 'How people communicate through the creative expression', and Grade 5-6 students investigated 'How mass media play an important role in our perceptions of the world".




Grade 1 and 2 _____

Based on the theme 'How significant people affect the way we live', Grade 1 and 2 students have successfully improved their thinking, research, and communication skills. They inquired about criteria that make someone significant. One of these is that such a person must have a long-lasting impact on their country or the world. Our final project in this unit of inquiry was to make a poster about the chosen person, while at the same time students began to learn about the main elements of a poster, including title, content, and pictures. Besides, the Grade 1 and 2 students also learned about cultures around the world and inquired 'How cultures express their traditions through art'.









Grade 3 and 4

Grade 3 and 4 students have created amazing dioramas this term, inspired by Ancient Civilizations, and using materials of their own choice. Their 'masterpieces' included a pyramid and a colosseum made of cardboard, a sphynx made of Lego blocks, as well as an artistic Aboriginal painting, and a Ganesha statue made of clay. Grade 3 and 4 students also explored 'How People communicate through the creative expression'. They also conducted individual research into the life of famous artists and inquired how they explored and expressed their feelings through their works. Being inspired by various artists, the students will make their own projects of creative expression. The students also learned to express themselves through dance and movements in Physical Education, including rhythmic gymnastics.

Grade 5 and 6 _____

In the beginning of Term 2, Grade 5 and 6 students have focused on the theme 'Where are we in Place and Time' and explored 'How past civilizations shape our present-day conditions'. Students used visual art to create dioramas representing ruins and monuments from ancient civilizations that have survived. Students also explored a new topic about 'How the mass media play a

central role in our perception of the world. Students started their research on the history of mass media, including digital, printed, and broadcasted media. For their English language assignment, students wrote a newspaper article about someone important and then reported what an interview with them might look like.









The Middle Years Programme

The closing of schools and online learning during the COVID-19 pandemic posed major challenges for education, affecting YIS students, their teachers, and their parents. Fortunately, the restrictions have become more relaxed in recent months, and since the beginning of the second term, the YIS received permission to conduct hybrid learning, which combines online learning at home, with face-to-face learning at school. When we observe the activities of the MYP students in term 2, we notice that most students truly appreciate the real school environment, versus the virtual online learning process.

Their enthusiasm was also reflected in active participation, and various activities, such as the celebration of Halloween, the Science Demo, and the Mask Book workshop As the Covid-19 pandemic continues, the highest priority for the YIS will remain to provide a safe learning environment for its students and to secure the continuity of education based on its full International Baccalaureate program, face-to-face, hybrid or on-line. The success depends on the joint endeavors of students, teachers, and parents.

Grade 7: English Language and Literature

So far, the academic year 2021-2022 was a unique experience, we transitioned from a virtual online learning environment to a face-to-face learning environment in the school, albeit still with some restrictions and health protocols. In English classes, the Grade 7 students started with a kaleidoscope of imagination and knowledge in their novel study of

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"The Giver" by the author Lois Lowry. The MYP students are beginning to grasp the usage of academic language, and to integrate, to relate, to imagine, and to wonder about the meaning expressed by the genre-specific language. In the process, they develop communication skills and strategies in comprehension, language, and text analysis.





Grade 9: Spanish Ab Initio


The topic of the unit this time is Neighborhood and Community, we have learned how to describe the neighborhood or town and the community we live in. The purpose of this unit is for them to open their mind and make them aware that there exist many kinds of neighborhoods, and that communities can also be varied. Besides respecting the people, that we live and work with, we also need to look after the environment of the place where we live. Students were asked to imagine their own smart cities and describe them using words, pictures, and photos.

Grade 10: Mathematics

Mathematically, functions are complex formulas that convert inputs into outputs. In real life, it is the same. Parents, teachers, and students together provide a broad range of inputs into the education of students enrolled in the YIS. Inputs from parents are to support students from home. Inputs from teachers are to coach students in a wide range of subjects so that they can understand, analyze, and solve complex puzzles (exams), and inputs from the students themselves are their motivation, ingenuity, and perseverance. All these inputs are vital to achieving the desired output.











The Diploma Programme

When we read the headlines of today's newspapers, our planet is facing multiple challenges for which we have no ready solutions. These conditions cause uncertainty for those that are affected but pose challenges for those who strive to find solutions. For effective and sustainable solutions, we need to think out-of-the-box. This aligns with the view of the Minister of Education to make students adaptive, creative, and innovative. This is also the essence of the IB program: The IB 'learner profile' spells out the basic philosophy that has been adopted by the YIS, and that is delivered to our students. In the IB education program, the student stands in the center, and our aim is to offer meaningful learning opportunities for our students. In a nutshell, these elements are reflected in the triple motto of the YIS: Aim high, be relevant, and make a difference.



Grade 11: Geography.

In Term 2, the Grade 11 students explore to what extent global interconnections are selective and only benefit a few. Indeed, there are a handful of champions that surf the waves of globalization. Singers, musicians, artists, and movie actors have become global icons through the commercialization of their songs, their music, their pictures, and their movies, and shape to a large extent our global culture. Those champions usually originated from high-income countries in which economic forces

control the networks and mass media to expand the markets for their products, often at the cost of local economies and indigenous cultures of other countries. Our students, aim at understanding the nature of globalization. They observe how new players emerge, such as China, India, and Korea, who also claim their share in the global markets.

Halloween
















End of Year 2021 Celebration Highlight
